Advent: the forgotten season?

Origins

- Western liturgical season (no equivalent in Eastern liturgical traditions) dates from late 4th century
- originally served as preparation period for adult rites of Christian initiation held on the vigil of Epiphany, varying from 4 to 6 weeks
- eventually, a special period was proclaimed as a more intense time of expectation, fasting and prayer from December 17-24 (NB: special prayers, O Antiphons)

Meaning

- originally, simply preparation for the feast of the coming of the Lord
- from High Middle Ages, began to develop message of glorious return of Lord at the end of time

The Liturgy: outline

Week 1	Theme:	Watch & Pray: vigilant waiting for the Lord
Week 2	<u>Theme</u> :	John the Baptist's challenge: prepare the way of the Lord!
Week 3	<u>Theme</u> :	The Messianic age is here: therefore, rejoice! (Gaudete Sunday)
Week 4	<u>Theme</u> :	The incarnation of the Word: the event set in motion

2 distinct phases:

<u>Phase 1</u>: beginning of Advent to December 16

- focuses on the two comings of Christ his first among us as human, his second in glory as judge at the end of time
- stirring themes of warning signs in nature and human history

<u>Phase 2</u>: December 17 - 23

• more personal - centres on Christ's humanity

in general, a challenging season for the southern hemisphere Church, as it is typically associated with images of winter and light in the darkness, when our days are getting longer and warmer!

Music in the Advent liturgy

the music of Advent should be characterized by a simplicity that gives way to building excitement and expectation

in my opinion, Advent requires a strong sense of "the season", more than any of other of the liturgical seasons, as it has already been overtaken by Christmas in thee secular world.
